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CIVICS AND MORAL EDUCATION (SECONDARY) SYLLABUS

INTRODUCTION

The Civics and Moral Education (Secondary) syllabus has been revised to incorporate more concepts and contents that are relevant to meet the changing needs and future challenges of the nation. National Education messages have been infused in the content of the syllabus. It has been designed to give greater emphasis to the imbuing of values and attitudes of responsible citizenship. This ensures that our pupils are knowledgeable about issues that concern the nation. In addition, the syllabus continues to reinforce the processes involved in the character development of our pupils through the acquisition of appropriate knowledge, skills and attitudes.

RATIONALE

In developing the syllabus, the following factors have been taken into consideration:

• The need to enhance our pupils' sense of emotional bonding and commitment to the community and the nation in the midst of increasing globalisation and a borderless world. Our pupils need to know and appreciate the uniqueness of Singapore, the struggles, constraints and vulnerabilities and the achievements of our nation, and the multi-racial, multi-cultural and the multireligious nature of our society.

- It is also of critical importance that our pupils have a sound foundation in ethics in a rapidly changing world.
- There is also the need to further heighten our pupils' confidence in our nation's future and security. Our pupils have to be provided with opportunities that help them develop instincts for national survival and confidence in the future.

GOAL

The overarching goal of Civics and Moral Education (CME) is to nurture a person of integrity who acts responsibly with the welfare and interests of others and the nation in mind. This is in line with the mission of our Education service which is to mould the people who will determine the future of the nation.

THEMES IN THE SYLLABUS

The five broad themes of the syllabus are:

- Character Building
- Family Relationships
- Community Spirit
- Our Nation, Our Heritage
- Challenges Ahead

Underpinning the themes in the syllabus is our nation's ideology, Our Shared Values:

- Nation before community and society above self,
- Family as the basic unit of society,
- Community support and respect for the individual,
- Consensus, not conflict, and
- Racial and religious harmony.

OBJECTIVES


In order to achieve the goal of nurturing pupils with integrity who act responsibly with the interests of others and the nation in mind, it is fundamental that pupils acquire the three basic components, namely, Knowledge, Skills and Attitudes.

The Knowledge component includes values related to character building; moral principles, values and norms which are the basis for sound decision-making; and concepts and facts regarding the development and the future of our nation.

The Skills component develops those processes that our pupils should master so as to be able to handle specific situations or problems including those that are related to the development of the emotional intelligence of our pupils.

The Attitudes component deals with inculcating in pupils the innate qualities, for example, respect, care and consideration, and integrity that would move them towards correct behaviour and action.

The possession and application of the appropriate Knowledge, Skills and Attitudes will bring about responsible behaviour and action, which is Conduct. This is illustrated in the diagram shown.



KNOWLEDGE OBJECTIVES

At the end of the CME (Secondary) programme, pupils will be able to:

- know what it takes to be a person of integrity,
- know the principles involved in making sound decisions,
- understand the importance of the family in society,
- know the values essential to the well-being of our nation including Our Shared Values, Singapore Family Values and the fundamentals of governance,
- know the people and the events of our nation's past, and their links with the present,
- know the factors that contribute to nation building,
- understand our nation's constraints and vulnerabilities, and know how our nation overcame these constraints,
- know the system of our government,
- be aware of the impact and issues of a fast changing world on our nation's survival and success,
- understand the importance of paradigm shift in a fast changing world.

SKILLS OBJECTIVES

At the end of the CME (Secondary) programme, pupils will be able to:

- apply the processes of moral reflection and reasoning,
- demonstrate respect, empathy, and care and concern towards others,
- demonstrate skills in relating to others in the home, school and community,
- apply teamwork skills,
- apply the skills of information gathering, data analysis, evaluation and synthesis,
- demonstrate actions that reflect active and responsible citizenry, for example, participation in the Community Involvement Programme.

ATTITUDE OBJECTIVES

At the end of the CME (Secondary) programme, pupils will be able to:

- accept and adopt integrity as a fundamental principle that guides their behaviour,
- have the desire to accept, initiate and harness change,
- have respect, empathy, and care and concern towards others,
- be responsible for their actions,
- be committed to preserving the racial and religious harmony of our nation,
- have a sense of bonding and commitment to the family, the community and the nation,
- have the willingness to contribute to the well-being, including the defence, of the nation,
- have confidence, loyalty and pride in our nation's success.

EFFECTIVE IMPLEMENTATION OF CME IN SCHOOLS

An effective implementation of the CME programme contributes to the achievement of the Desired Outcomes of Education. The school climate provides the fertile social ground in which the moral development and civic responsibility of our pupils can be rooted.

- CME is an integral part of the school programme, which includes the school climate, procedures, and organisation. Values are transmitted to our pupils not only through the CME lessons but also through the organisation and operation of the school as a social system, the school rules and discipline, the teachers' approaches to classroom management, examples set by adults, and opportunities created by the school to experience what is taught in CME.
- Opportunities must be provided through both the formal and informal curricula that enable teachers and pupils to take part in the democratic process, to exercise teamwork, to be gracious in behaviour, to act responsibly and to be involved in the larger community.
- Principals and teachers have a critical role to play in being actively involved in imparting the necessary knowledge, skills and attitudes that contribute to:
 - the character development of our pupils enabling them to have strength of character and moral integrity and to have the desire for lifelong learning;
 - (ii) a heightened sense of being responsible citizens who are conscious of their responsibilities to family, community and nation.

Two periods per week are allocated for the teaching of CME in secondary schools. Schools are given flexibility in the order that the themes are taught so that they can match the CME lessons with the relevant supportive activities that the school has planned for the pupils.

ASSESSMENT AND EVALUATION

The CME syllabus contains learning outcomes that define the knowledge and skills pupils are expected to acquire. They are meant to guide teachers in assessing the effectiveness of their teaching and the rate of progress of their pupils in terms of knowledge and skills.

The assessment in CME focuses on Knowledge and Skills. Schools are advised to have both formal and non-formal modes of assessment for CME. Participation in community involvement activities is a component in the non-formal mode of assessment.

As the CME programme is an instructional programme within the formal curriculum, it should be evaluated. This will help to assess the extent to which the programme has been carried out successfully and effectively.
